

Can any of you by worrying add a single hour to your span of life?

Matthew 6: 27, NRSV

Scientists tell us that our bodies are wired to fight or flee in the face of a threat. But so much of what worries us in life is not solved either by fighting or by fleeing. Instead, many of us suffer from chronic stress, as we live with uncertainties and with questions that seem to have no sure answers. Our unresolved problems are akin to fear in the effects they have on our minds, our bodies and our spirits.

Several years ago, my mother gave me a little book called <u>Red Sea Rules</u>, by pastor and writer Robert J. Morgan. He tells the story of a Canadian missionary named Isobel Kuhn, who had to flee from China after the Communist Revolution of the 1940's. She traveled on foot with her young son, arriving in Upper Burma with no money and no ability to speak the language, and she was still a long way from home.

Morgan says that in the midst of these difficult circumstances, Kuhn made two decisions. She decided to do her best *to cast out fear*, and to simply *seek light for the next step*. "She had no idea how to get out of Asia," Morgan says, "but with God's help she could figure out what to do" on any given day; to find food, money, a safe place to stay, and ways of communicating with the outside world. Eventually, Isobel Kuhn and her son arrived safely in North America.

"When you don't know what to do next," Morgan says, "trust God for guidance, and if you can't see what lies dimly in the distance, do what lies clearly at hand." This is good advice for all of us!

## NOTES FROM THE SESSION MEETING OF AUGUST 10, 2025


June Stewart, Clerk of Session
